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Introduction

Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) is a serious human rights violation affecting millions of girls and women worldwide. Despite extensive international efforts to eliminate this practice, it persists due to deeply entrenched cultural and religious traditions. This study aims to explore and analyze the various strategies employed to combat FGM and assess their effectiveness in different socio-cultural contexts. The importance of this issue cannot be overstated, given its significant impact on the health, well-being, and rights of women and girls. FGM inflicts immediate physical harm and leads to long-lasting psychological trauma and health complications, emphasizing the urgent need for comprehensive intervention (World Health Organization, 2021).

FGM is practiced in many parts of Africa, the Middle East, and Asia, with an estimated 230 million women and girls having undergone some form of FGM (United Nations Children's Fund [UNICEF], 2024). The practice is often justified by cultural, social, and religious beliefs, making its eradication particularly challenging. Cultural traditions uphold FGM as a rite of passage, a means of controlling female sexuality, or a requirement for marriageability (Shell-Duncan, 2008). Although religious justifications are not universally accepted within any major religion, they are also cited to legitimize the practice (Boyle et al., 2001). These deeply rooted beliefs necessitate a multifaceted and culturally sensitive approach to effectively combat FGM.

The trauma inflicted by FGM extends beyond physical pain to severe psychological and emotional consequences (Rodríguez-Sánchez et al., 2023). Survivors often experience chronic pain, infections, menstrual problems, childbirth complications, and sexual dysfunction (Berg & Denison, 2013). The psychological effects include anxiety, depression, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), and feelings of betrayal and mistrust (Behrendt & Moritz, 2005). Addressing these complex issues requires an integrated approach that encompasses legal reforms, educational initiatives, medical support, and community-based interventions.

Legal interventions are crucial in the fight against FGM. Many countries have enacted laws criminalizing the practice, but enforcement remains a significant challenge (UNICEF, 2024). Legal measures alone are insufficient if they are not supported by community engagement and education. Educational programs focused on increasing awareness about the dangers of FGM and

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
